# **Wading out this summer**

Families took advantage of the Kingsmere Park wading pool during a particularly scorching July, according to data from the City of Ottawa. Staff recorded a daily average of 41 bathers over the first four weeks of the pool's 2020 season, for a total of 795. July 21 and July 28 registered peaks of 74 and 72 bathers,

respectively.

COVID-19 precautions limited users to eight per half-hour slot, although children under two accompanied by an adult were considered one user.

The pool was open Tuesday to Saturday, beginning July 14 until August 27.

# **Work continues to address growing** traffic problems

The City of Ottawa has provided detailed responses on a proposal by the Carling Woodroffe Rescue Coalition to improve local traffic and safety.

The Coalition said the responses set the stage for on-going dialogue and show an openness to address some important issues for the residents of Woodroffe North, Carlingwood, Woodpark, Glabar Park and Whitehaven.

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They also hope their ideas will collectively guide future decision-making on major projects happening along the Carling Woodroffe corridor.

The proposal was presented via videoconference on April 7 to Bay Ward City Councillor Theresa Kavanagh and staff from the City's transportation and traffic management divisions.

COVID-19 has reduced the amount of vehicle traffic significantly, making it difficult to demonstrate the need for change. At the same time. intensification and other development projects across Ottawa's neighbourhoods have not slowed.

The Coalition intends to press ahead with their work, understanding that solutions will take time but knowing things will only get worse if development proceeds without proper consideration for the impact on local roadways.

#### Maintenance team

Volunteers clear and flood the ice surface daily between mid-December and late-February (typically in the evenings after skating closes, but can be during the day, too, depending on snowfall and other weather conditions).

#### Supervision team

Volunteers take 3-hour shifts to keep the fieldhouse open so that skaters have a place to lace up. warm up and use the washroom. They also log the number of skaters per hour. Supervised skating hours are a requirement for the City of Ottawa to provide the boards, lights and other equipment for the rink.

## Ice-building team

It's all hands on deck when conditions are right for building the base ice at the beginning of the season! Volunteers are needed to pack down the snow with sleds or other tools, and then flood regularly until the rink can open for skating.

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## Glabar Park #1 in 2020 neighborhood study

In a study that emphasized the importance of community integration, Glabar Park has been recognized as the best place to live in the nation's capital. Ottawa Magazine said Carlingwood West - a catch-all name for the neighbourhoods of Glabar Park, Woodpark and McKellar Heights excelled in several categories, including walkability and housing suitability.

Crunching the numbers available through the Ottawa Neighbourhood Study, the magazine found that all residents in the area are within 15 minutes of a grocery store, and close to 30 per cent commuted by public transit prior to the pandemic. It also liked the fact that more than four out of five houses were built before 1980.

Glabar Park's neighbours to the north in Carlingwood, Laurentian View, McKellar Park and Highland Park - an area the magazine called Laurentian - ranked second on the list. Hintonburg, Old Ottawa South and Westboro rounded out the Top 5.

# Did you know?

Hare Avenue is named after Henry Hare (1774-1860) who emigrated from Ireland to Canada around 1823 and purchased 150 of the 200 acres of Lot 27, Concession 2, located in the Ottawa Front of Nepean Township (an area encompassing present-day Glabar Park). Hare sold some of this land to his son, Robert, who farmed the land for more than sixty years with his family of twelve.
