### Setting records at the rink

The 2021 rink season was one of the most challenging as public health guidance continued to evolve, affecting fieldhouse access. maximum number of skaters and permitted onice activity.

On top of COVID-19 restrictions, there was a lack of snow. In past years, a foot of snowfall could be compressed down to 2 or 3 inches and flooded to create a starting point for the ice. This year, volunteers flooded the frozen ground 19 times to create the base ice surface.

In the end, the season was one of the longest on record and it's in no small part due to the support of community members and seven very dedicated volunteers who maintained the ice.




