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## **Street speeds in Glabar Park** reduced as "Gateway Community" measures take effect

At the Glabar Park Community Alliance Annual General Meeting on October 5th, 2021, Bay Ward Councillor Theresa Kavanagh announced that Glabar Park – and the adjacent neighbourhoods of Woodpark and Carlingwood - would be designated as Gateway Communities. This designation is for roadways within residential areas that have speed limits below 50 km/h.

In November 2021, signs indicating a 40 km/hr limit were installed at every entry point into Glabar Park from Maitland, Woodroffe and Carling. This is one more traffic calming measure being taken by the City of Ottawa to address the many complaints about speeding traffic made by residents.

#### City shares data from Lenester speed board

In the fall of 2021, the Alliance requested data from the speed board located on Lenester, just west of Aaron. For the year to October 19, 2021, more 278,000 vehicles were observed. As the board records for one direction only, Lenester likely saw traffic of about 1,500 vehicles per day.

96% of those trips were below the old speed limit of 50 km/hr, and 56% were already travelling under the new speed limit of 40 km/hr. The vast majority of the remaining vehicles were travelling in the 50-60 km/hr range.

#### Residents can take action

Changes to speed limits, and other road measures such as parking and traffic calming, can be implemented with ward councillor support and a clear, favourable consensus of 66% of residents on the entire street.

A speed camera in front of D. Roy Kennedy School will be one of 15 installed across Ottawa in 2022. According to its Traffic Service Catalogue, the City receives more than a thousand inquiries each year from across Ottawa requesting that action be taken to address speeding.

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## Residents highlight concerns with development site at 1940 Carling

Glabar Park residents have reviewed the development plans for a new building near the corner of Carling Avenue and Dunlevie Avenue, and recently outlined their concerns in a letter to Bay Ward Councillor Theresa Kavanagh.

Residents in the northeast end of the neighbourhood will be most implicated by the proposed seven-storey apartment building at 1940 Carling. They have asked for the enforcement of the Right of Way on Carling Avenue – a protection described in the City's Official Plan, but not reflected in the developer's application.

With a 44.5m Right of Way between Richmond Road and Bronson Avenue, the City can eventually transform Carling into a "complete street" – a term used for street design that offers safety and mobility for all users regardless of age, ability, or mode of transportation.

Residents also raised concerns about protecting the root zones of trees and hedges adjacent to the site, and noted the potential for drainage issues at nearby properties if the finished grade above the proposed underground parking garage does not

match the existing ground elevation.

In an email responding to the letter, Councillor Kavanagh wrote that she has asked for the site plan application to be reviewed and voted on by Planning Committee members, although this step would not normally be needed for a project that respects zoning requirements.

"This adjustment to the process will give residents and other stakeholders the opportunity to make up to 5-minute presentations to committee members to convince them to vote

against or in support of the site plan application," she wrote. "Although I am not a member of the Planning Committee, I will be present to support you and ask questions directly to developer and staff."

A review by the Planning Committee is in addition to two meetings hosted by Councillor Kavanagh before the application was filed. She has confirmed that residents who have submitted feedback on the project will be notified should the developer change something in their application and submit new documents. She will also note in her weekly Bay Ward Bulletin that the application was updated.

As the pace and scale of residential construction accelerates across the city, a committee of the Alliance is looking at creating guiding principles to present to developers interested in building in Glabar Park. These principles would articulate features of the neighbourhood that residents would like to see preserved, such as tree canopy and accessibility. As it evolves, the Board will report on this work via the Gazette and www.glabarpark.ca.

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## Outdoor rink season got an early start
